Project Title:

Improving Educational Outcomes in crisis ravaged Anglophone Cameroon

Project Overview:

This project aims to address the critical challenges facing the educational sector in the crisis ravaged Anglophone regions of Cameroon, particularly in the context of ongoing social unrest, infrastructure deficits, and resource constraints. The project will focus on improving access to quality education and enhancing educational opportunities, and fostering long-term sustainable development for these communities.

Objectives:

1. Education:

- Improve infrastructure and resources in schools to enhance the quality of education.
 - Increase access to education, particularly for marginalized and vulnerable groups, including girls and internally displaced persons (IDPs).
 - Strengthen teacher training programs to improve teaching quality and educational outcomes.

Scope:

1. Geographic Focus:

- The South-West regions of Cameroon especially, Koupe Manengouba, Manyu, Ndianand Lebialem (Anglophone Cameroon).

2. Target Population:

- Communities affected by the ongoing crisis, internally displaced persons (IDPs), rural populations, women, and children.
 - School-age children, teachers, and healthcare providers.

Key Components:

Education Component:

A. School Infrastructure Improvement:

- **Objective:** To renovate and improve the infrastructure of schools in Anglophone regions.
- **Activities:**

- Conduct school infrastructure assessments to determine the most critical needs (e.g., classroom spaces, sanitation facilities, desks, and chairs).
- Build or refurbish classrooms and administrative buildings.
- Provide safe learning environments by addressing issues like lack of proper sanitation facilities and unsafe classrooms.

B. Access to Education:

Implementation Timeline:

Budget Estimate:
